The Origins of Fairness Norms

Kenneth Binmore (born 1940) holds the 2nd Franz Vranitzky Chair for European Studies of the University of Vienna since October 2009. Professor of Economics at the University College London (UCL), after holding corresponding positions at the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) and the University of Pennsylvania and Michigan. Onetime Professor of Mathematics at LSE. Grants from National Science Foundation, Economic and Social Research Council, Suntory and Toyota International Centres for Economics and Related Disciplines and others. Chairman of LSE Economics Theory Workshop, Director of Michigan Economic Laboratory, Fellow of the Econometric Society and British Academy. Awarded the Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) in the New Years Honours List 2001 largely for his role in designing the UK 3G Spectrum Auction. Author of 77 published papers and 11 books. Extensive collaboration with 25 co-authors.

Research in evolutionary game theory, bargaining theory, experimental economics, political philosophy, mathematics and statistics.
