Helga Nowotny is Chair of the European Research Advisory Board, EURAB, an independent high level group advising the EU Commissioner of Research and, since 2005, Fellow of the Science Centre Vienna. Before she was Professor of Social Studies of Science at the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology Zurich and Director of its Collegium Helveticum. She was also Founding Director of "Society in Science: The Branco Weiss Fellowship". Among her recent publications are "Re-Thinking Science. Knowledge and the Public in an Age of Uncertainty" (with Peter Scott and Michael Gibbons) and, in German, "Imaginierte Laien. Die Macht der Vorstellung in wissenschaftlichen Expertisen". Three more books will be published this year: "Cultures of Technology and The Quest for Innovation" (New York; Berghahn Books), "The Public Nature of Science Under Assault" (New York; Springer Verlag) and "Unersättliche Neugier. Innovation in einer fragilen Zukunft" (Kulturverlag Kadmos, Berlin).

Raghavendra Gadagkar obtained B.Sc (Hons) and M.Sc. in Zoology from Bangalore University and Ph.D. in Molecular Biology from the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore. During the past 25 years he has established an active school of research in the area of Animal Behaviour, Ecology and Evolution. Raghavendra Gadagkar is now Professor at the Centre for Ecological Sciences, Indian Institute of Science, Chairman, Centre for Contemporary Studies, IISc, Honorary Professor, Jawaharlal Nehru Centre for Advanced Scientific Research, Non-Resident Permanent Fellow of the Wissenschaftskolleg (Institute for Advanced Study) in Berlin and Vice-President, Indian National Science Academy. He has published over 200 research papers and articles and two books, *Survival Strategies* (Harvard University Press, USA, 1997 and Universities Press, Hyderabad, 1998), and *The Social Biology of Ropalidia* (Harvard University Press, USA, 2001.

In memory of Albert Einstein, the Bruno Kreisky Forum for International Dialogue based its programme in 2005 on the historic correspondence about **"Why War"**, which Albert Einstein and Sigmund Freud exchanged in 1933. The thoughts on the issue of war, which these two great personalities of the 20th century laid down in their letters, are taken as the point of departure for a new, contemporary survey – combining a look at the past with a look at ongoing developments and a look to the future. On the occasion of the Einstein Year/Year of Physics 2005, we wish to call back to memory and to transpose to the present through topical commentary and reflection the question, *whether there is a way of delivering mankind from the menace of war*, which Einstein posed to Freud in 1932.
